





Martino Genchi (1982) lives and works in Milan. He took his MA at IUAV University in Venice, where he has started working between theoretical research and artistic practice. His particular approach has been further developed through residency experiences: in Italy, at Fondazione Ratti (Como), Fondazione Spinola Banna (Turin), Viafarini (Milan), and abroad (Bern, Paris, Berlin).

Besides the artistic practice, he is involved in other correlated fields: academic teaching; collaboration with companies; sound and audio research.

Among Italian exhibitions: *Time and Details* (Carlo Scarpa's sites, Venice 2016); *Comets Buried Underground* (Studi, Milan 2016); *VIR Open Studio* (Viafarini, Milan 2015); *80* (Gum Studio, Turin 2012). In Europe, his work has been shown in France (*Acuta Cuspide*, Istituto Italiano di Cultura, Paris 2013), in the Netherlands (*BYTS*, Stedelijk Museum, s'Hertogenbosch 2011), in Belgium (*Transvisions*, bkSM, Strombeek 2009).
